Reliable linking of researchers with their research is impossible using their names

The scholarly record is broken



The solution: unique author identifiers

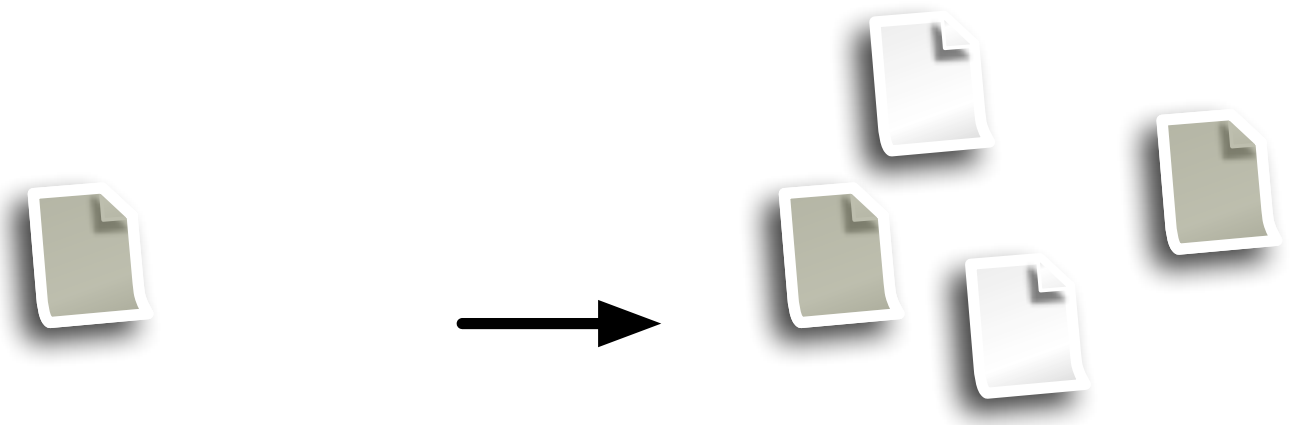
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Benefits: Access

Reliable linking of researchers with their research facilitates access to research

Easier to find research outputs by a particular researcher

Easier for institutions and institutional repositories to facilitate open access



Benefits: Evaluation

Reliable linking of researchers with their research facilitates evaluation

Not just journal articles, but also posters, datasets, book chapters, patents, etc.

Not just research outputs, but also funding, people, etc.

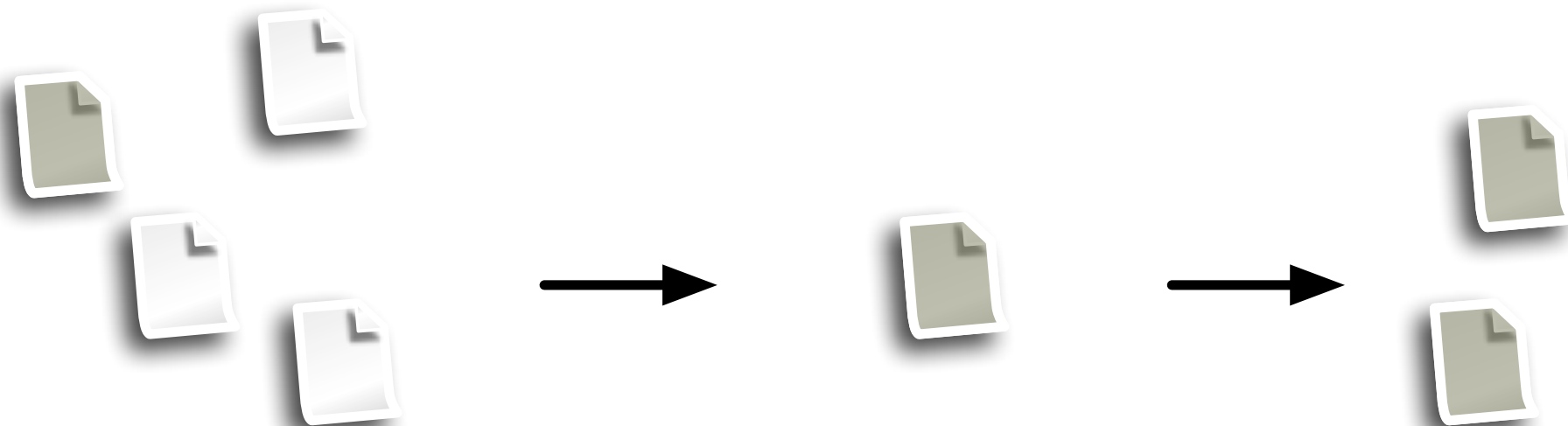


Benefits: Discovery

Reliable linking of researchers with their research facilitates discovery

Easier to find other research outputs by the same researcher or by his collaborators

Easier to find other researchers through co-authors



Why is ORCID a Solution?

Global	Not limited by discipline, institution or geography
Open	<p>Inclusive and transparently governed not-for-profit</p> <p>Data and source code available under recognized open licenses</p>
Integrated	<p>Third-party seeding of profiles</p> <p>Part of institutional, publisher, and funding agency infrastructure</p>

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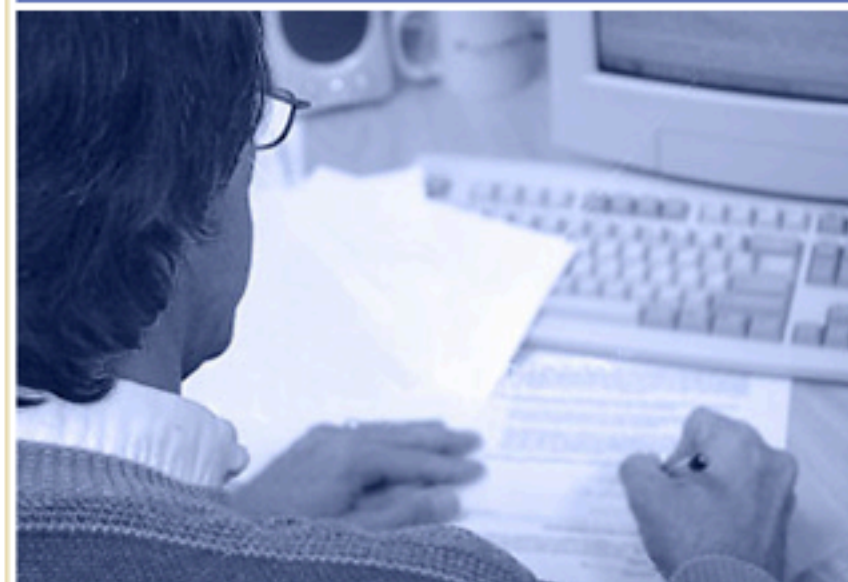

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What is ODIN?

ODIN – *ORCID and DataCite Interoperability Network* - is a two-year project which started in September 2012, funded by the European Commission's 'Coordination and Support Action' under the FP7 programme.

Partners in ODIN are innovators in science, information science and the publishing industry: CERN, the British Library, ORCID, DataCite, Dryad, arXiv and the Australian National Data Service (see [Partners](#)).

The ODIN mission

ODIN will build on the ORCID and DataCite initiatives to uniquely identify scientists and data sets and connect this information across multiple services and infrastructures for scholarly communication. It will address some of the critical open questions in the area:

- Referencing a data object
- Tracking of use and re-use
- Links between a data object, subsets, articles, rights statements and every person involved in its life-cycle.

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
